



Alma Street Commons is a future green and 100% sustainable development project in East Durham. DCLT has demolished one sub-standard structure and will soon demolish the others to prep the site. The next steps include selecting a design team and engage in a community-led integrative design process. This development is pursuing the rigourous Living Building Challenge green building certification.

Championing Change: Shirley Sherrod In Honor of Women's History Month

As Women's History Month draws to a close, it's important to recognize that women make history every day and play an important part of the community land trust movement. Shirley Miller's story epitomizes this truth. Born in 1948 in Baker County,

Georgia, she faced tragedy at 17 when her father was fatally shot in a dispute with a white farmer. This heartbreaking event fueled her lifelong dedication to racial justice and social change.

Meeting her future husband, Charles Sherrod, at a civil rights meeting in Baker County marked the beginning of a transformative partnership. Together, they led the Southwest Georgia Project and established New Communities, Inc., recognized as the nation's "first community land trust".

Shirley's commitment extended beyond racial lines. At the Federation of Southern Cooperatives, she aided black and white farmers alike, preserving land and fostering cooperative initiatives.

New Communities Inc. laid the foundation for all community land trusts, including DCLT. We honor Shirely Sherrod and all of the leaders, past and present of New Communities for their vision and commitment to equity.


Join Us

Be a Beacon of Hope. Donate.

In its early years, DCLT was invited to renovate housing on the 700 South block of Buchanan Blvd. Initially receiving a donated house, DCLT subsequently purchased and renovated four more houses at different times to maximize their impact. Most were converted from duplexes to single-family units, following the land trust model, and sold to first-time homebuyers. Established in 1987 by concerned residents, DCLT emerged in response to mounting housing issues like rising costs, absentee landlords, and housing disrepair in the community. Expanding Where We Own & Who We Serve



Over thirty years later, DCLT self-manages 196 permanently affordable homes in eight neighborhoods: West End, Lyon Park, Burch Avenue, Morehead Hill, Lakewood Park, East Durham, Hayti, and Southside. DCLT is a partner in an additional 117 managed units.

As of 2023, DCLT has expanded its focus to encompass the **entire City of Durham** in its efforts. The organization recognizes that affordable housing is necessary city-wide and has restructured the approach to meet that growing need.

We build, advocate for, and manage permanent affordable housing in Durham. The biggest need for affordable housing in Durham is for families at 30% area median income (AMI) and below.
